



#### **Dr Rick Johnston**

He leads the WHO half of the WHO/UNICEF Joint Monitoring Programme for Water Supply and Sanitation, which monitors water, sanitation and hygiene at global, regional and country levels. Prior to joining WHO in 2013 he worked at Eawag: the Swiss Federal Institute of Aquatic Science and Technology, and at UNICEF. He has over 20 years of experience on WASH in low- and middle-income countries, with a focus on monitoring and drinking water quality. He holds degrees in environmental engineering from the Johns Hopkins University and the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

#### **Kate Medlicott**

She is the sanitation and wastewater team leader in the water, sanitation, hygiene and health unit of WHO in Geneva. She is responsible for normative guidelines and global monitoring of wastewater as well as implementation tools such as sanitation safety planning and the WASH linkages with disease prevention programmes particularly neglected tropical diseases and antimicrobial resistance.

## Prof. Lyla Mehta

She is a Professorial Fellow at the Institute of Development Studies, UK, and a Visiting Professor at Noragric, Norwegian University of Life Sciences. A sociologist working in development studies, she uses the case of water and sanitation to focus on rights and access to resources, resource grabbing, the politics of scarcity, gender, power and policy processes. Her work also concerns gender, displacement and resistance and climate change and uncertainty from 'below'. She has extensive research and field experience in India and southern Africa. She has published about 90 scientific publications including the most recent edited book, Flows and Practices: the politics of integrated water resources management in southern and eastern Africa.



#### Dr. Andrea Iff

She is Thematic Advisor of the Democratization, Decentralization and Local Governance Program at Swiss Development Cooperation. She focusses on governance programming in fragile contexts, political economy analysis and public finance. Before joining SDC, she worked until 2015 as Head of the Statehood and Business & Peace Unit at swisspeace. She holds a PhD in Political Science from the University of Bern and is a lecturer at the University of Zurich. Her PhD focused on federalism and conflict transformation in India and Nigeria. Before joining swisspeace, she worked in the Political Science Department of both the University of Zurich and the University of Bern, as well as for the Swiss Federal Government and Berghof Foundation in Sri Lanka. In 2015 she was a post-doc fellow at the University of Pennsylvania in Philadelphia and worked on economic power sharing.

### How to get to the venue:


